Ann Heck. The club has 14 members and word has barely gotten out.

The SDPC is a club dedicated to the intermediate and advanced hikers of San Diego. You don't have to be a tiger to join. You do have to love to hike. Jim Sugg, Terri Astle and Terri Sutor are slow paced leaders, but they may hike 6 to 16 hours. There are specific times when a fast paced hike will be lead, but the leader will tell you beforehand. I have a hard time describing the difference between people who should join the club and those who shouldn't. I guess I should ask you what you think of when you think of a hike. If your answer is a 5 mile trail walk that lasts 2-3 hours, then the Sierra Club will suit you better. The reason I mention this is not because of a snobbishness, but because it is unsafe for this type of a hiker to join SDPC activities. It is both unsafe and unpleasant.

Awards

There are 105 peaks on the San Diego Peaks List (if you are a member and don't have a copy of the list, please give me a call). Hiking 100 peaks earns the Macho award (Fem.=Machete). Climbing 50 peaks earns the mini-macho and completing the list of 105 peaks earns the mega-macho. It is strongly suggested that, as you arrive at a milestone, you carry champagne to the peak (caviar optional) and have a classy celebration. (Sparkling cider may be substituted for alcohol).

Earning mini-macho awards are: Gordon MacLeod (up in LA!), Wes Shelberg, Amentia Allegro, Rass Webbo, Paul Freiman and Al Holden. Jim Sugg and Terri Astle are only a few away. Jerry, how many do you have? The only holder of the Macho award is Paul Freiman (which makes sense since I had to scout the list to formulate it).

Awards are being designed by the award-winning Betty Sterrett, and should soon be available.

Meet The Leaders

Jim Sugg: Jim recently completed the 200th Wednesday wilderness hike for Walkabout International(231-7463, hrs 9am-2pm). Jim has a loyal following of 15-30 people per hike. His hikes are about 11 miles and 5½ hours. He leads a moderate pace with appropriate rest stops. Jim only leads the same area once per year, so he visits many scenic areas in a year's time. His hikes are usually less than one hour's drive to the trailhead. He is very safety conscience and is thoroughly knowledgeable about the area he is hiking in.

Al Holden: In addition to occasionally leading a hike for Jim, Al frequently solo hikes cross-country. Al and Jim are similar in

leadership style. Both have a strong concern for safety, and pre-hike the trip to be aware of options. Al is a list finisher on the HPS.

Terri Astle and Terri Sutor: I put the twin Terri's together because they usually lead and assist on the same hikes. Sutor is a three time HPS list finisher and Astle has finished the list once. If you are interested in the HPS contact one of these two fine ladies. I personally have Sutor to thank for introducing me to the HPS about 8 years ago. Around November they will start leading PCT sections! They lead a slow-moderate hike. Terri Astle is usually going somewhere every weekend, so give her a call.

HPS, DPS and SPS: HPS stands for "Hundred Peak Section". DPS stands for "Desert Peak Section". SPS stands for "Sierra Peak Section". These are three hiking sections of the Angeles Chapter (LA) of the Sierra Club (the nation's largest Chapter).

The HPS has 271 peaks on their list. HPS has something for everyone. It has some peaks that are 400 feet of gain and $\frac{1}{2}$ mile, that takes 10 minutes to climb. It also has some peaks that are 6000 feet of gain and 17 miles, and 14 hours as a dayhike. HPS mountains range from San Diego to the lower Sierra. Usually 3-4 easy hikes are combined to make a moderate to strenuous day.

DPS has 97 peaks on it's list. While HPS has easy hikes, the DPS average hike takes 6-8 hours at a faster pace, with 3000-4000 feet of gain and mostly off trail hiking. DPS mountains are in Ca, Nv, Utah, Az and Mexico.

SPS has 247 Sierra peaks on the list. Most trips are backpacks (DPS and HPS are mostly dayhikes) and are, by necessity, fast paced.

Carl Johnson: I am a bit jealous of the hikes that Carl leads. I want to go on every hike, but work prevents me from doing so. I was introduced to Carl last year when a friend told me of his Baja hikes. Carl is a very strong hiker, but he can lead slower as well as fast hikes. I have not hiked with him when he was the leader, but all my friends speak very highly of him.

Terry Flood: Terry is a National Sierra Club and a Outward Bound leader. Nuff said.

Paul Freiman: The club founder has completed the HPS and DPS lists. I am a former bicycle racer and bike tourist. I have hiked with each of the leaders and am very proud to have the finest leaders in San Diego associated with the club. I expect to pick up a couple more leaders in the next few months.

What NOT to expect from your Leaders

I am very proud of the top quality of leadership available to SDPC. BUT, you know, the best of leaders can not make up for a foolish hiker

or unfortunate circumstances. Know your limits! If you are only fit for a 4 hour hike and you go on a 10 hour hike and don't have a good time, then IT IS YOUR FAULT! If you have trouble with your balance and frequently stumble when doing crosscountry, then don't do crosscountry! Stay on trails! BE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOURSELF! These are the days of teflon presidents and ridiculous lawsuits because people seem to believe that the 'other person' is responsible for bad outcomes. My leaders are all top quality (PDF Choice) and they provide great happiness to many hikers, but when one hikes in the wilderness unexpected things may happen and you may get injured even with the best leader. Who's fault? Unless you are willing to accept responsibility for your life please stick to trail hikes and stay in a neat line betwixt the leader and the 'sweep' on another organization's hikes.

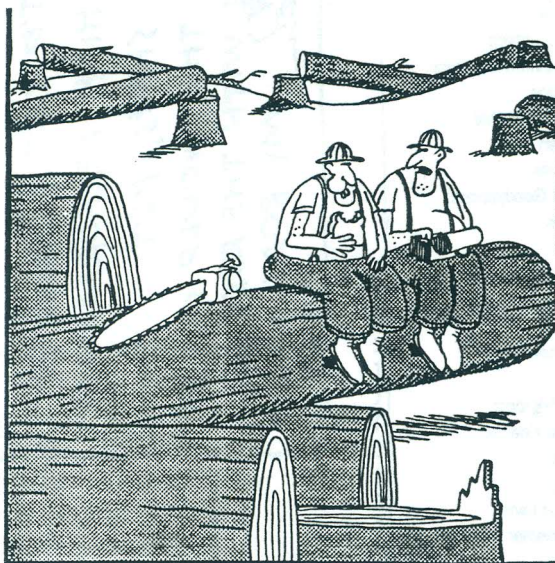

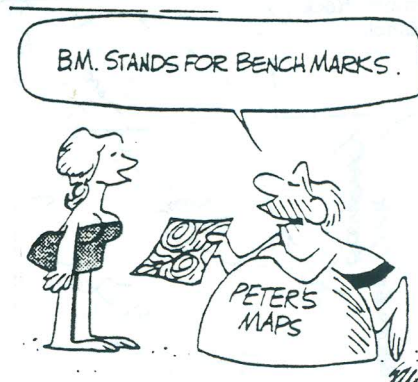
We need to conserve water

in a wasteful way.

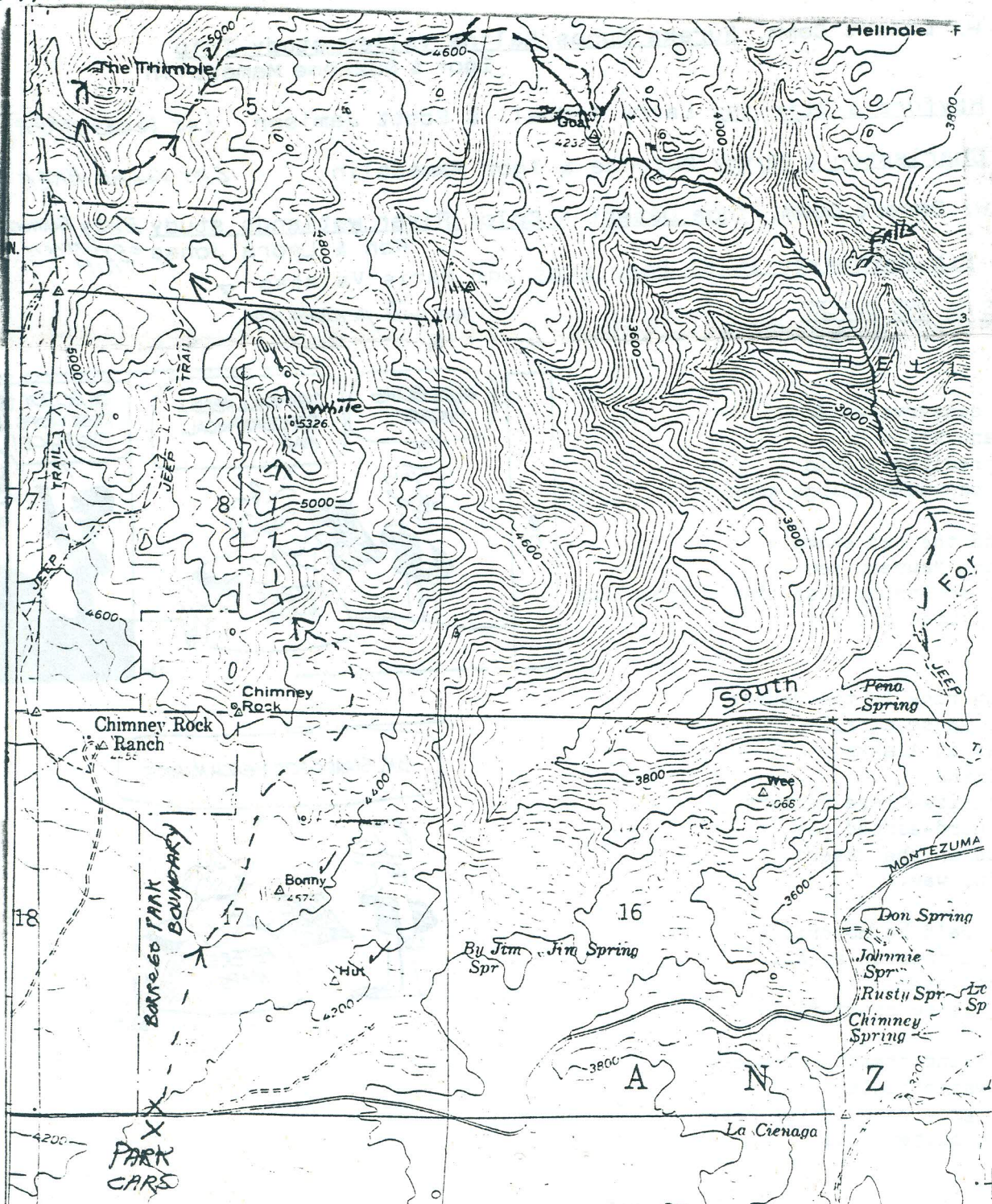
They say there'd be no crisis

As lawful consideration for being permitted by the SAN DIEGO PEAKS CLUB or any of its officers, agents, servants, volunteers, activity participants, or employees, herein referred to as releasees, to participate in these activities and/or use their equipment, the undersigned does for him/herself, his/her heirs, executors, administrators, legal representatives, guardians, distributees, and assigns, collectively referred to as releasors, hereby release, waive, discharge and relinquish any action or causes of action for personal injury, property damage, or wrongful death which may hereafter arise from the activities or any pursuit incidental thereto wherever or however said pursuit may occur and for whatever period said activities and pursuits may continue. The undersigned further agrees that under no circumstances will the releasors prosecute or present any claim against releasees for any causes of action, for personal injury, property damage or wrongful death, whether the same shall arise by the negligence or non-intentional conduct of any of said releasees from the activities or any pursuit incidental thereto.

The undersigned and the remaining releasors hereby agree to indemnify, save and hold harmless the releasees and each of them from any loss, liability, damage or cost (including attorney fees) which releasees may incur as a result of injury, death or property damage to the undersigned

This document is intended to be as broad as is permissible under the law of the State of California and this agreement shall be interpreted under the laws of the State of California. If any portion of this agreement is invalid, it is agreed that the balance shall continue in full force and effect.

The undersigned has read and voluntarily signs the release and waiver of liability and indemnity agreement and further agrees that no oral representations, statements, or inducements apart from the foregoing written agreement have been made.

The undersigned acknowledges that he/she has read the foregoing paragraphs and is completely aware of the potential dangers incident to engaging in the activities, and is fully aware of the legal consequences of signing the within instrument.
