### CALIFORNIA ORIENTEERING CHAMPIONSHIPS AT PALOMAR MOUNTAIN SEPTEMBER 14-15

The two-day 1991 California Championships Class "B" meet will start and finish in the Doane Pond area of Palomar Mountain State Park and will feature courses ranging from beginners' "trail hikes" to forays into the farthest reaches of the Park on the advanced courses. We have reserved six campsites in the Doane Valley Campground for Friday and Saturday nights, September 13 and 14 at \$16.00 per site per night, including Mistix charges. The campground has hot showers and we will have a campfire activity Saturday night. The sites will accomodate up to eight people and includes admission for one car each; you can reserve your space at \$2.00 per person per night by calling Bill Gookin at 578-9456. Additional cars are \$5.00 each so be the first to apply for a site ... or try to reserve an additional site for your group by calling Mistix at 1 (800) 444-7275. For non-campers, there is a daily Park use fee of \$5 per car so car-pool if you can.

You may compete either or both days and awards will be presented based on total times for the two days. Because of the Park fees, entry fees for the meet will be the usual \$4 per day or \$7 for both days with SDO members getting a \$1-per-day discount. Groups may go out on the White or Yellow Courses only at \$7 per group plus \$1 for each additional map. The family fee for individual events is \$8 per day or \$15 for both days (-\$1 per day discount for SDO memebrs!). Entries may be made at the registration area on Friday, Saturday or Sunday ... see the directions at the State Park entrance.

SAN DIEGO ORIENTEERING meets start at 10:00 a.m. unless otherwise noted. Registration and instruction for beginners and to help orienteers move up to a more difficult course begin an hour before first starts and continue during the meet ... usually until noon. Most meets are followed at noon by a pot-luck picnic and discussions of the courses for the day. Registration fees for most meets are \$4.00 and include the map. Compasses may be rented for \$1.00 and whistles purchased for \$1.25 each.

SDO MEETINGS are held on the third Thursday of each month at the Standley park Recreation Center, 3585 Governor Drive, between Regents Way and Genesse Ave., in University City. Each meeting begins with a pot-luck supper and social at 6:30 p.m. followed by the program at 7:30; come early and get to know some of the members!





As Carl prepares to lead El Cajon Mtn via the ridgetop road (partially shown) on Sept 7 I wanted you to know the rockclimber's route up the face. The start is past El Monte Park. Drive to the damn gate, then turn around and go about ½ mile (until you see a use trail). Hike up the use trail until you hit a road. Turn left at the road until it ends at a old mine. Contour through the brush (sort of following the telephone poles, you will find a trail), then take the use trail up the steep ridge. There are a couple of class 3 moves on this section and it is tiring. There are some trail markings to keep you on track, but be careful, the rescuers are tired of pulling people off of this mountain. When you reach the top plateau a road will take you to near the peak, where a clipped trail will take you to the peak. Warning: This is a tough route and people do get hurt. Know yourself. Some hikers will accuse me of overdramatization, but quite a lot of hikers get rescued off this mountain and I don't know the skill level of everyone.

Rancho San Luis, Sierra Juarez, Baja California car camp

November 2-3, 1991

Leader: Carl Johnson 448-8542

I am organizing an "easy" car camp to Rancho San Luis (Laguna Hænsen area) of the Sierra Juarez. The higher elevations of the Sierra Juarez are part of Parque Nacional Constitution de 1857. This area is a beautiful pine forest plateau with a shallow lake (usually dry this time of the year). Rancho San Luis a very small, extremely isolated private ranch about 7 miles north-east of Laguna Hansen and is at a oak-juniper high desert elevation. We will camp at either Rancho San Luis (if the owner is willing) or Laguna Hansen.
