"Ken" is at the end of the desert divide, about a two hour drive from Mission Valley. Call her at 278-3518 if interested.
- Carol Murdock had the perfect fall colors when she went on her Escalante Canyon lead for the Sierra Club. She had 4 other adventurers along.
- Last issue I featured a list of the California county highpoints that Gary Suttle sent to me. He has sent me a correction to the list, that is, Sonoma County/Cobb Mountain West Rim 4480+, a volcanic crater.
- Ken Olson and Terry Flood bagged their SPS emblems 8-12-93 on Mt Goddard. Ken and Terry both have over 65 SPS peaks now.
- It was a great canoe trip! Nine adventurers met at Hoover Dam by Las Vegas and canoed two days down the Colorado River in ideal weather. Next October we will paddle from Needles to Lake Havasu, through the scenic Topock Gorge to end at London Bridge.
- John Strauch and I hiked the Secret Canyon trail that follows Pine Valley Creek last Sunday (Oct 24). The trail is 17 posted miles and took us 8:45 hours. The trail is set up for horsemen to use, but the evidence is that <u>none</u> do! The trail continues to get overgrown and is in pitiful shape. It needs the CCC to spend a month cleaning up the brush before you could certify it. I put orange trail tape at a few places so someone who wasn't familiar with the trail could find it. John, by the way, has the goal of rehiking all 192 hikes in Jerry's *Afoot and Afield*. He has done about 35 hikes.
- Al Holden is perplexed. The Hi-Sierran "lost" his hike schedule. This means that Sierra Clubbers will not know about the wonderful hikes Al is leading. Yes, he is still going to lead them for any SDPC hikers who are interested!!!!!!!!!!! Terri Sutor and Terri Astle also have the same problem. Oops! Relax, I will list their hikes and more.
- I got a nice letter from Betty Sterrett regarding the deletion of Battle Mountain from the peaks list. This knoll by Lake Hodges is famous as "the hill with the cross". Betty sent me the story on the hill (limited space forces me to summarize). On Dec 6, 1846 a small American regiment of 100 men led by Brigadier General Stephen Kearny with scout Kit Carson rode over the hills into the San Pasqual Valley where they confronted the Californios (AKA Mexicans) in battle. The Californios, under the command of Gen. Andres Pico, brother of the last Mexican governor of California, Pio Pico, were better prepared to fight and dominated the Americans. Two days later, Pico had the Americans trapped on

Mule Hill (thought to be Battle Mountain) when Kit Carson, an Indian and Lt Edward Beale, USN, stole away in the night more than 26 miles 385 feet to the Presidio to get reinforcements from the Navy garrison. A memorial hike use to be lead by a Sierra Club person from Battle to Presidio. Mexican domination of California ended a month later when a treaty signed by Pico and Gen. John Fremont at Cahuenga ended the war. Thus, the events at Battle Mountain played an important role in the advance of California to statehood.

- Wes Shelberg sent me this article from the LA Time, 7 October 93: Man

 Trapped by Boulder Amputates Leg. Denver. A 38 year -old man
 amputated his own leg and crawled to his car to reach help after he was trapped
 under a boulder in the mountains.... William Jeracki, a physician's assistant, was
 walking to a fishing hole when a boulder fell on his leg and trapped it... He
 dragged himself a half mile and drove for help.
- This reminds me to print an update on the letter Mark Adrian received concerning his use of his ham radio on hikes. Investigation indicated that the letter complaining about Mark's use of the radio on Sierra Club hikes was solely the irritation of one person, Larry Tidball, current chair of the SPS. Last month, while visiting the Sierras with Terry Flood, Mark was once again called upon to use his ham for a rescue of a injured hiker.

SAN DIEGO PEAKS CLUB LIST

Original June, 1987 by Hannah North and Russ Weber Revised 3/91, 3/92, and 8/93 by Paul Freiman

History of the SDPC List

In June 1987, hikers Hannah North and Russ Weber (aka Amentia Allegro and Rass Webo respectively) combined their extensive knowledge of San Diego county's terrain with additional information obtained from maps of Cleveland National Forest. The result was a formidable list of peaks and a commitment to bag them all. Life, however, intervened and they moved away, but not before each had climbed about half the peaks. Taking up the cause I climbed every peak and benchmark (BM) on the original register. Then I eliminated insignificant climbs and areas of trespassing. In total I deleted 35 peaks and added 25 new ones. Preparing this list was such an enjoyable exercise that I still get all a-tingle thinking about climbing them again.

Overall the list is challenging, not because the hikes are especially hard (no rock-climbing or class 3 skills required), but because you will need good map reading skills. The 14 peaks preceded by an asterisk (*) are the distinguished Emblem Peaks, winning this designation for the particularly sublime rewards each destination provides to those who are willing to plod and scratch their way to the top.

Speaking of reaching your destination, you may either hike or mountain bike to do so. However, not only are drive-ups and helicopter rides illegal and disqualifying, they will earn you the antithesis of the coveted Hiker of the Month Award which is the Weenie of the Year Award.

Whenever visiting a peak, include as some of your "10 essentials" a pencil, paper, and empty can. The following explains:

Never let them say it Say it to your shame That a benchmark went untrodden And without your date and name!

Map coordinates are based on Cleveland National Forest (CNF) 1985 map. USGS topos are 7 1/2' unless identified as 15'. Completion of this list is dependent upon your map reading and orienteering skills.

Other Notes

"Pyramid", "Mile High", and "Square Top" are three peaks mentioned in Jerry Schad's Afoot and Afield in San Diego County (1986 edition) and nowhere else. The reference Schad is to this book. The following abbreviations found in the list refer to sections of the Angeles (LA) Chapter of the Sierra Club: DPS=Desert Peaks Section; HPS=Hundred Peaks Section; LPS=Lower Peaks Section.

Private Trip, Improve Your Spanish,
\$690 Including Air

The Chihuahua-Pacifico Railroad, that took almost 100 years to complete, runs between Los Mochis, Sinaloa, near the Gulf of California and Chihuahua City, Chihuahua, which is about 212 miles south of El Paso, Texas. In between the two cities the railroad goes over a mountain range, the Sierra Madre Occiddental or more specifically the Sierra Tarahumara, by way of 39 bridges, 86 tunnels, and unbelievable scenery. The lumbering-ranching, pine forested town of Creel is approximately in the middle of the mountains. Between the major cities there are several very small, old (from the late 1600's) pueblos and mining villages, magnificent waterfalls, and of course, Barranca del Cobre (Copper Canyon, only one of three "Grand Canyon" like interconnecting canyons.

I am organizing another trip to the Sierra Tarahumara at the end of December. I am an art teacher (27 years), currently in the San Diego City School, a Sierra Club outings leader, and a frequent visitor to the Sierra Tarahumara (I was last in the Sierra this past August). I am looking for a minimum of 10 and a maximum of about 15 persons to join my wife and me on a special winter adventure. We will go to some very unique places, visit local people I have gotten to know, take the breathtaking train ride, and view the splendor of the Sierra. All accommodations will be good to excellent, while at the same time costs will be kept to a minimum. I try to blend in with and get to know the locals. This is a chance to improve your Spanish language and Mexican cultural skills. The trip is intended for persons willing to be flexible while looking for adventure. In addition, it is for persons who enjoy nature, a little hiking, have a respect, curiosity, and fascination for others cultures and places. This is a private trip not a commercial tour. Cost: basically for your expenses, about \$690 including air, lodging, some meals, taxi, airport tax, and tips, except Tarahumara Indian baskets, personal purchases, and \$30-\$40 in optional rides. I think that the Sierra Tarahumara is a fantastic place, but I can not really adequately describe it in this short note.

If my trip is something that you are interested in, give me a call so that we can start planning for what will be a highlight of the winter holidays - or as an alternative, if you are interested in going in August 1994, let me know.
