July's HOTM goes to the first woman to complete the SDPC hiking list, CAROL MURDOCK. She previously won the HOTM in December, 1992, for organizing the the Sierra Club's Mountain Medicine clinics since 1978. In addition, she completed the Sierra Club's Hundred Peaks Section hiking list. But Carol is more than just a determined hiker. She is also a home health RN practicing through UCSD which recently (May 5) honored her as one of six OUTSTANDING Nurses of the Year. - △ OOPS, I made some boo-boos. Last issue I chopped off Oakzanita Peak (elev. 5054) from the first page of the peak list. It should be number 5 under Cuyamaca State Park. Garnet Peak should be listed at 5909, and Jacumba Mountain at elev. 4512. Gary Suttle (club member and author of California County High Points) remarked that the elevation I gave Mt Whitney (14,492') is actually lower. He said that the new topo maps give the distance in meters and converting it to feet will give you 14,491. (His editor at Wilderness Press changed his calculations to 14,492').
- △ HOT MAP TIP FROM GARY SUTTLE....

 You can buy one to five maps from the USGS Earth Science Information Center (ESIC), 345

 Middlefield Rd, MS 532, Menlo Park, CA 94025, (415) 329-4390, FAX (415) 329-5130. Visa or Mastercard phone or fax orders take just days to receive rather than weeks as through the USGS in Denver. Cost is \$2.50 per map with a \$1.00 handling fee applied to mail orders less than \$10, but no tax or postage fees!!!
- △ HOT MAP TIP FROM RICHARD CAREY....

 "On June 1, 1994 the USGS 15-minute map is officially abandoned. This means that 15-minute maps will no longer be available from the USGS. However, copies of color separates will still be available for sale and descriptive information will be maintained for reference." (USGS-Western Region)
- △ CINDY OUTLAW will leave May 29 to tackle Denali again. The last time she was prepped to go (June '92) she discovered one week from departure that she was pregnant. Her daughter's name, Molly McKinley, attests to Cindy's obsession with the summit of the highest peak in North America. Cindy will be taking the HOTeM Pole with her and promises a summit photo for the next issue.
- △ JIM SUGG celebrated his 67th birthday and his 350th Wednesday Walkabout hike April 13 on Blue Angels Peak (AKA Smuggler's Peak). His adoring legion of admirers showered him with gifts.
- ∆ We had fantastic weather on the DAWN'S PEAK hike, April 16-17. Carol needed to bag the peak in her quest to list finish. Joining us was John Strauch, Beth Davis and Lorin Mitts, a Borrego resident. When we picked up Lorin at 3:00pm it was 90°. We drove up Rockhouse to the end near Hidden Springs and were able to pick up the shade from the narrow canyon walls when we started at 4:30. The next day was overcast and stayed a lovely 70°.
- △ WES SHELBERG introduced me to the Rockhouse Canyon approach to Dawn's Peak. People who know other routes report delight with the relative ease of this way.

- ∆ Beth and I were gazing over at Toro Mtn, some 14 miles in the distance, thinking what a rough go it was when we hiked it with Jerry Schad in 1991. It took 11 hours and cramped legs to reach Dawn. Then we read in the register on Dawn's Peak that Werner Landry hiked to it from Toro in 5 1/2 hours. (I understand that Werner has also been up K2.) Beth wants me to lead the Santa Rosa Ridge hike as a three day event. I may do it over Labor Day weekend, Sept 4-5-6.
- DAWN'S PEAK (AKA Peak 6582) is a lovely peak, but how did it get it's name? Well, back in the '70's the AAA Riverside County road map named it. What we didn't realize at the time was that the AAA gave it a fictitious name to insure copyright protection of the map. Every map has one false name on it. I was checking the Rand McNally San Diego County Recreation map the other day. It has Villager listed, but where Rabbit Peak should be is "Kawal Mtn elev.5859". This is an outright falsehood because they even got the elevation wrong. Well, I have the 1989 edition of the AAA Riverside County map and Dawn's Peak is now called "Lorenzens Peak elev. 6582". I will continue to call it "Dawn's Peak", rather than Peak 6582.
- △ BETH DAVIS' company is delightful, but the fact that she and Ralph own a home at Ram's Hill and have jacuzzi privileges makes her truly wonderful. After a tough, hot Richard Hughes hike in Borrego a few years back, Beth broadcast that everyone was invited to join her at Ram's Hill. "I don't believe you, Beth," came a response, "I'm totally exhausted and you want to climb another summit!"
- Δ SDPC hiking list finisher JOHN STRAUCH and partner Evan Bailey were high scorers for the ACBL Regional bridge tourney during Easter week. Congrats on the win!
- △ On the Dawn's Peak hike I learned about an old character named "CREOSOTE" who ducked a desert path from Mexico towards Canada at least ten years ago. He apparently continues to write a newsletter, and if we can find some of the trail guides he has written I will be very, very happy to lead a series of adventure "PDT" (Pacific Desert Trail) hikes in the fall months.

- A RICHARD CAREY writes, "I take issue with Pk 3583 being the high point of the Vallecito Mountains. If you look on the AAA San Diego County map and the Whale Peak 7.5 min topo you will find the Vallecitos extend some distance. I say that Whale Peak is the high point of the Vallecito Mountains." ---- Absolutely correct, Richard. The Vallecito Mts do extend a long way east and west. Sunset and Whale Peaks are two named peaks on the western side of the range. Peak 3583 is the high point of the eastern side and is labeled as such on the hiking list.
- A RICHARD continues the letter, "On Thursday, June 9th I will show slides of Aconcagua at the PCT (Pacific Crest Trail) group meeting. The location is the home of Chris Landa, 5030 Pacifica Dr. 274-5154. Time is 7:30 PM. Mark Adrian and Shelley Rogers will probably be there too with their prints. Hope you can come." Chris, a SDPC club member, extends an open invititation to all SDPC members. Remember, however, that this is a Sierra Club event.

The Hiker of the Month Award (A Retrospective)

Once a year I like to honor the club members who have received this award by reprinting their names and achievements. For the club's many new members I will go back to the birth of the HOTM. SDPC started in May, 1991. By the first June newsletter Beth Davis the Amazing had earned a few kudos. Here's what I wrote: "SD hiker of the month! Beth Davis, in three consecutive weekends did (1) a 16 hour trip from Clark Dry Lake to Rabbit; (2) a 32 mile Santa Rosa ridge traverse; and (3) a self-described 'Hike from Hell' in Death Valley, a mere 15 hour day. I can't believe people think 'Wonder Woman' is fiction. I get exhausted just thinking about it!" At that point the hiker of the month became a working concept deserving capital letters and an ongoing role in the club. All it needed was a

tangible symbol and a name. So, in July I asked the membership for help locating a suitable object to pass to each subsequent Hiker of the Month. Carl Johnson soon answered the call and donated a handsome chain of three interlocking rings he had carved from a single piece of wood. (For those who don't know him, Carl is a renowned wood sculptor.) Terri Astle drummed up a name for it and then, at last, the "Hotem Pole" was born.

Well, after that I thought I'd have a hard time finding 12 people per year to acknowledge, but instead I've had difficulty restricting the choice to only one person a month. As the HOTeM Pole

matures, it travels well--from McKinley in Alaska to Aconcagua in Peru, and a number of other notable continental peaks in between. As we speak it's on its third trip up McKinley. And it doesn't need an oxygen tank.

Look for the HOTeM Pole on the Hiker of the Month's pack.

I asked SDPC List Finishers Carol Murdock and John Strauch to write about their five favorite (or unusual) adventures. Their written adventures follow. Since I also finished the list I wanted to list my trips.

My Favorite Adventures on the SDPC List by Paul Freiman

1. Thimble loop. I led the first SDPC hike to this spot. The loop begins by bagging The Thimble, a rock dome near Ranchita. I continue the hike by orienteering to benchmarks around Hellhole Canyon. Very exciting!

2. Morena Butte. My favorite non-desert hike. On the peak are three distinct vista points. As you hike up from the dam, the first glimpse of the butte's huge granite slab will take your breath away.

3. Puff. Shoot the best photos of the Goat Canyon trestle in Carrizo Gorge from this peak. Every photographer should come here.

4. Split Mtn-West. I can't believe I'm on Planet Earth while hiking down Oyster Shell Wash

on the return trip.

5. Red Top and Sawtooth. No one else leads these hikes. We've bagged Red Top from McCain Valley and Agua Caliente. Magnificent adventure.

6. Mile High-Rosa-Pyramid. A great 12-hour trip at the end of the Santa Rosa Ridge.

7. Pinyon Ridge (BM Wilson). Surprised to see an easy hike on my list? I like this one as the perfect "Sierra Club type" hike.

Carol reports a jet flying on its side through the canyon when she climbed Split Mtn-West, beautiful western redbuds on Oriflamme Mtn, and a big ol' rattlesnake on Windy. Each one of us has great adventures to tell. You can too!

Reflections From The First Woman SDPC List Finisher.

I first saw the SDPC list in early 1992 and thought, "NO, not another list!" I had already climbed many of the peaks but did not intend to "finish" this list. In December of '93, I did Ruth, Zosel, Crab and Alice solo and decided that the hardest was over, Why not go for it! The beauty of this list is that you learn more about what is right in our own back yard and don't have to drive all over southern California.

I was fascinated by the terrain north of S-22 and the list gave me a reason to explore it. Intriguing names such as Gasp, Groan, Puff, Grunt, Moan, Goat and Yak just have to be climbed. My first peak on this list was El Cajon Mtn back in Jan. 1975.

Some of my favorites are: Coyote, for its view of two earthquake faults; The Thimble, interesting slot; The Zosel to Alice ridge, splendid feeling of isolation and conquest; Vallecito, varied terrain through washes, over boulders and along ridge; Peak 5386', our perfect day with excellent view of snowcapped mountains and bighorn sheep; and Volcan for its panoramic desert to ocean view.

Least enjoyed were Japacha; scramble through trees and no view and Palm; steep, narrow loose ridge. I climbed 21 peaks solo and plan on reclimbing 7 peaks which are duplicates from the HPS list and Blue Angel which I haven't been up since 1976. I would even do 6582 again, even though I don't "NEED"

Hi Paul,

Here's a somewhat tardy list of five of my most memorable SDPC peak hikes.

Eagle Crag, March 1986, via Cutca Valley. Back in my early hiking days my smoking out-of-shape buddy Ray and I did this peak, then ran out of daylight; my lousy flashlight lasted about a half hour and we couldn't see the trail. We built a fire and spent the night then hiked out in the morning and called our somewhat worried wives.

"Pyramid", March 1987, Sierra Club BMC desert backpack led by Richard Hughes and accompanied by desert rat "Old Creosote" (D.W.Tomer). We started at Coachwhip Canyon and ended in Wonderstone and Travertine Palms Washes. I had to hobble out the last few miles after spraining my foot.

Morena Butte, SDPC hike, September 1991. Jerry Schad took a photo of Paul, Carl Johnson, Mark Adrian and me which he put in the 2nd edition of Afoot and Afield in SD County. Beth Davis, Dave and Peggy were also in the hike but weren't as lucky. It's always a treat to hike with Jerry.

Ruth, Zosel, Crab and Alice. Did these solo in December 1992 as a loop hike starting on the north side of the Villager-Rabbit ridge in Barton Canyon. Got caught in the rain and the dark, couldn't find my tent, but was able to find the HPS Rabbit Peak trail and get back to my car at 10pm.
