WEEKEND OUTINGS CALENDAR

These hikes are all moderate to strenuous. I have attempted to credit the organization responsible whether it be a SDPC, Sierra Club (SC), Walkabout, San Diego Orienteering (SDO), Coachella Valley Hiking Club (CVHC), San Diego Hiking Club (SDHC) or private activity.

- JULY 8-12 MISION SAN PEDRO MARTIR, Friday-Tuesday with Carl Johnson 448-8542. "A five-day backpack covering 10-15 miles daily on the plateau of Baja's Sierra San Pedro Martir to some of the prettiest, pine surrounded meadows you will ever see in these mountains. We will visit the isolated ruins of the Mission. Not too hot at 5000'. Need to be in excellent hiking condition."
- JULY 16 PCT, IDYLLWILD. Saturday. Chris Landa (274-5154). Chris will walk from Black Mtn to Humber Park, about 14.5 miles. It's Chris' favorite section of PCT. SC
- JULY 17 ORIENTEER, Big Laguna. S-1 and Noble Canyon trailhead. Sunday. Bill Gookin (578-9456). SDO
- JULY 22-24 GRAYBACK BACKPACK. Dennis Richards (462-3643). Hike into High Creek camp using the moonlight on Friday. On Saturday bag Old Grayback (aka San Gorgonio Mtn), Jepson, and Dobbs, returning cross-country to camp. Kick back the rest of the day because you don't have to leave until Sunday! SC
- JULY 26-29 GRAYBACK BACKPACK. Tuesday-Friday. Al Holden (273-2494). Four days and three nights. Hike in from Poopout Hill to High Meadow Springs to set up base camp, then bag the peaks on the following days. Private trip open to SDPC members.
- AUG 5-13 HIGH SIERRA PEAKBAG EXPLORATORY. Dennis Richards (462-3643) Rob Langsdorf. Join them for nine days as they venture deep inside Sequoia to visit the spectacularly scenic high country surrounding Nine Lake and Kaweah Basins. They will climb Mts. Kaweah, Triple Divide, and five others. Much of the route is over steep cross-country terrain with backpacks. Some Class 3 climbing possible. Call Dennis between 7-9 PM before July 8 for info. He has room for one more. SC
- AUG 11-21 FLORENCE LAKE TO IONIAN BASIN with Carol Murdock 463-1279. Ferry ride (\$10) across the lake and 3 days of cross country with a climb of Mt Goddard. This was to be a \$400 National SC trip, but has been changed to an "own expenses" chapter outing.
- AUG 13-20 COPPER CANYON. Carl Johnson (448-8542). "We will fly from Tijuana to Los Mochis and take the train into the mountains. Normally it is green, not too hot (5000' elevation), with lots of water and afternoon thunderstorms. 9 days, 8 nights, stops and side trips to rivers, waterfalls, pine forests, jungle, Tarahumara Indian caves and paintings, historical villages, missions, some hiking, and more. Hotels are all very good, with the hotel at Cerocahui charming and rustic and the Posada Barrancas Miradora, downright breathtaking. Cost: \$860 for almost everything. This is not a commercial tour but a small intimate adventure." SC.

"And the lizards are beginning to blow on their feet now," he said.



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

Mt Israel elevation 1346 feet



The Thomas Bros map location (1994 edition) is p. 1149, grid A&B 1. The easiest route description I can give is to take I-15 to 78. Go east on 78 to the first exit, Nordahl Rd. Turn left (south) on Nordahl Rd and stay on it as it becomes Citracado Pkwy, then Country Club Drive. Make a right at Harmony Grove Rd and continue to Mt Israel Rec Area, which will be on the left. Gary Suttle's "California County Summits" is in the stores now and SDPC is listed. Last week I received a request from LA for the peaks list, so people are buying his book. If anyone is interested I have the Arizona Highpoints list. (I talked to mountain pioneer Barbara Lilley recently and she says that she and Gordon MacLeod are bagging the high point of all the mountain ranges in Nevada now that they're done with Arizona.)
