



THEY MAKE AN IMPACT!

here is a group of people whom we hikers should be indebted to. That group is the trail building volunteers. Locally the LAGUNA MOUNTAIN VOLUNTEER ASSOCIATION was founded in 1985 to operate under Forest Service standards. They have over 200 people who conduct interpretitive activities (eg.. nature walks and campfire programs), staff the Visitor's Information Office, coordinate trail maintenence and patrols, assist in many special projects, and operate the campgrounds in association with the Forest Service. Each year the group puts in greater than 20,000 hours of work.

Bill Kahn (561-9965) coordinates the foot and mountain bike patrols and trail maintenance projects. Last year Bill's crews spent over 3,000 hours on the PCT, Sunset, and Secret Canyon trails. We'll honor the Volunteers by hiking the Sunset and Secret Canyon trails this year. (A tripsheet on the Sunset trail is on page 7).



SUNSET TRAIL -Laguna

AtrailIenjoy frequenting during the summer months is the Sunset trail. This "hikers only" trail is closed to bikes and horses. The trail starts opposite the infokiosk at the mile 19 sign post on the Sunrise Hwy. Schad's book describes a pleasant, nonstressful 8 mile walk combining the Sunset and Big Laguna trails. One of my favorite offshoots is to depart from the Sunset trail after a mile (about 20-25 minutes) and descend west and southwest crosscountry down a hunters' use trail. This drops you to a fenceline at the end of Crouch Meadows. If you want to bag MANZA, following the fence to the far end of the saddle where you will find a trail leading to the peak. If you don't want to take this sidetrip, continue down the watercourse, a steep downhill to the Noble Cyn trail. Walkup Noble Cyn, through the gate, to the paved road (Pine Crk Rd). Hike up the pavedroadaboutamileturning to the right on a jeep road Continue up the other drainage channel as the dirt road becomes a path along the creek, widening to a road

again as you gain access to Big Laguna Meadows. From here you can either return to the Sunset or Big Laguna trail.
