

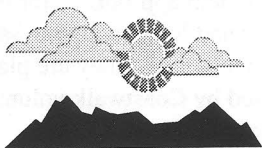

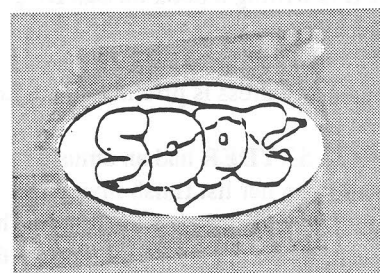
## THE PERFECT HIKE

I'm in heaven. I have participated in the perfect hike. Let me tell you what we saw: dozens of morteros, dozens of shard pieces, three deer, cactus wren nests, petroglyphs, a fifty-foot waterfall, beautiful vistas, an oasis, and the perfect campsite!

Just 45 minutes into the walk we saw our first mortero. At two hours we were looking at the Recluse Springs ruins of Frank Nichols. Frank spent summers out here in the 1960's and 70's. His cement cabin was the victim of Hurricane Kathleen. Because of too much sand in the cement mixture, the shack melted in the heavy rainfall. Guy Harris, who leads for the San Diego Hiking Club, showed us a secret cave which had three sleeping bags, a sleeping pad, heavy rope, pots and pans, tennis shoes (size ten), coffee filters, batteries, matches, earplugs, a vest, playing cards, a CB radio, a shovel, soap, stove, coffee creamer, "Wet Ones", a bottle of 1989 Pepsi (yes, I can tell the vintage) and a 1989 dime.

There are springs along the route, so everyone hiked with a light pack. After lunch we found another heavily sharded area at the head of Pinto Canyon. Inching around a fifty-foot waterfall we entered Pinto Canyon. Seven lazy hours after we had started we fell upon that perfect campsite. Yes, the perfect campsite. It was nestled between an oasis, whose trickling water lulled us to sleep, and ancient petroglyphs, on perfectly flat soft, fluffy, sifted sand where you

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What a week for adventure hiking! Preceding Al's Monday hike to Blue Springs on the north side of Pinyon Mountain, Guy Harris camped in the area in time for a snowy white Christmas, and was forced to wait for Santa. John Strauch and Christina Wire, a few hundred feet away a couple days earlier, found the remains of a mountain lion. John pointed out its location on the map to Al and Al's group found it. Along with the perfect hike described in the headline article, I had an incredible adventure hiking week.

Al sez the tougher he makes the hikes the more people want to go with him. I thought Al led a harder hike than I usually do. Anyone who has gone on a Holden hike this year should be able to go one of my hikes. He has a terrific group.

Five peaks, Pyles Peak, Kwaay Paay, Perpendicular Bluff, Palm Mesa, and The Sirens have been added to the peaks list for a total of 117 peaks and benchmarks. **PYLES PEAK** is on the shoulder of Cowles Mountain, just above Golfcrest Dr and Mission Gorge Road.

Jerry Schad described **KWAAY PAAY** in his Roam-O-Rama Reader column, Dec. 21, 1995, p.73, and in his 2nd edition of Afoot and Afield. This 1194-foot peak is listed on the Mission Trails Regional Park maps and has one trailhead opposite the Old Mission Dam and another at the intersection of Bushy Hill Drive and Father Junipero Serra Trail. Elevation gain is 900 feet. I find hiking Kwaay Paay in virtual solitude favorable to hiking the Cowles Mountain freeway.

**PERPENDICULAR BLUFF** (elevation 1741 feet) is the majestic name of a benchmark on Yaqui Ridge, East of Yaqui Pass. One trailhead is at Yaqui Pass. Vicki and I hiked it December 26 and found the cholla very stimulating. Head off at a compass

**TERRI ASTLE, TERRI SUTOR AND CHRIS LANDA** are adding on the mileage as they hike the Pacific Crest Trail. The two Terries have 1000 of the 2600 mile Mexico to Canada trek completed, and Chris is close behind with 737 miles. Chris has also been editing corrections in the route for Wilderness Press.

The **BBB+ (BITCHIN' BROAD BRIGADE)** has been formed by pioneering

members Terri Astle, Terri Sutor, Carol Murdock and Barbara Raab. To qualify you must be age 55+ and proud of it! Members must wear BBB+ T-shirts. (The "+" is for Chris Landa, who obviously doesn't fit the criteria, but was voted in as the token male so they could apply for federal funding). Applications for membership are being accepted by Odella at 571-0471.

**COYOTE CANYON** has been closed to cars, not hikers, from Middle Willows to Upper Willows, 3.1 miles. I understand mountain bikes will be allowed through, but not as an organized event (i.e., no more Klunker Klassic with 400 cyclists thundering down the tracks).

For those looking for the adventure of a lifetime, Coastwalk announces an unprecedented, **OREGON TO MEXICO, 1100 MILE LONG, 100 DAY, CALIFORNIA COASTAL TRAIL HIKE -1996**. This one time event will start on National Trails Day, June 1st, and will spotlight the Coastwalk dream of a completed California Coastal Trail. Coastwalk will be the first organized group ever to walk the entire length of the coastline. The 13 hikers will walk 10 to 15 miles a day, their gear hauled, camping arranged, and meals provided. There is limited space available

with priority given to those wishing to walk the entire distance. The cost per hiker will be \$3000 or \$30 a day.

In addition, Coastwalk will host it's 14th annual series of shorter coastal hiking and camping trips in the summer of 1996 featuring 4 to 6 day walks through California's most beautiful coastal sights and interesting seaside towns. Hikers will discover secrets that can be found only by walking in any of California's 15 unique coastal counties. These easy to moderate hikes are both appropriate for people new to hiking and long enough to satisfy the experienced hiker. They are planned and conducted by Coastwalk volunteers familiar with the local area.

Walkers will explore salt marshes, redwood forests, secluded beaches, coves, towns and villages, historic buildings, harbors, marine labs and more. Coastwalkers will stay in such places as a Russian fort, a State or National Park, an aquarium, a nature preserve or a youth hostel. Experts on natural and human history will join the group to enrich the walks. The evening campfire will provide time for relaxation, informal talks, and entertainment. Camping gear is always shuttled from campsite to campsite and hearty dinners are provided by Coastwalk volunteer cooks.

Those wanting a more challenging trip can sign up for the eight day backpack trip that will explore the only extensive roadless coastal area in California, the legendary and rugged Lost Coast of Humboldt and Mendocino.

The basic cost for the Coastwalks and the Backpack is \$30.00 per day for adults, \$15.00 for students and \$12.00 for children 12 and under. Some counties have additional surcharges.

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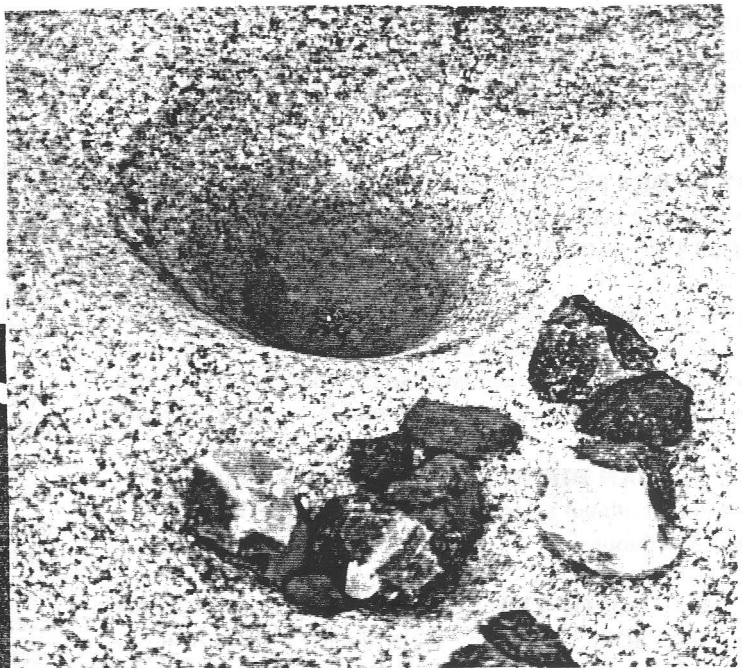
to reach the World's 14 8,000-meter peaks) and his frequent partner Jean Troillet. Beyond their astonishing climbing accomplishments, I was emotionally gratified to read their responses to the question :

### 'What makes you angry?'

**JT:** The most horrible is what we do to the children of the world. Even here, we ask a lot of them. To be at the head of the class...sure it's important, but these kids don't let loose very much. Children are more and more caught up in the system, and they lack light. Money should only be something you earn to have a good time. That's why I only work as a guide when I feel like it. And I have the life that pleases me.

**EL:** You open the paper, you turn on the television, and there's plenty to get you mad. I wonder where we are headed. In the mountains, one can forget, one feels apart from the world. Perhaps it's self-centered, but if people were a bit more self-centered, maybe we would live a lot better. It's important to feel good about yourself in order to feel good about others. The mountains give me that equilibrium, and if I had to live my life over again, I would do exactly the same things.' "

heading of 50°, climbing the 500 foot mountain in front of you and walk the ridge two miles to the benchmark. Estimated RT time is 3 hours. The other trailhead is 600 feet of gain and one mile to the peak. This starts on Highway 78 by Round Granite Hill, near the turnoff to Sunset Mountain. Park at Call Box 78-800. Estimated time is 1.5 hours. The cholla shouldn't cause any problems this way.

**PALM MESA** was written up in issue 16 (Jan-Feb '94) and issue 18 (Apr-May '94). It is located on the ridge line south of Indianhead.

**THE SIRENS**, elevation 4401, is at the edge of Hellhole Flat, south of benchmark Tuck.

Welcome new member Richard Whitcomb, who is working on the HPS list, and Paul Richter, who hikes with Al Holden's group.

didn't need to worry about stickers grabbing naked toes. No bugs either.

The last activity for the day, finding benchmark "Jack", rewarded us with a lovely southeast view-Davies Valley to Laguna Salada to Mexico's La Rumerosa-and a northern view of the Salton Sea.

Sunday we headed up a ridge into another canyon for the return trip. This took us into Myer Valley, past cactus wren nests, a sighting of three deer, more morteros and the heaviest shard area I've ever seen. In total, a transcendent trip...

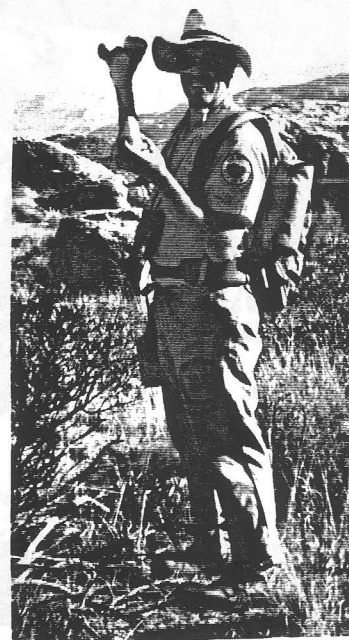
